Birth Control and Acne

If you are using or are going to be using birth control for its intended purpose or otherwise, here's a list of some of the most common options that are low in androgen potency, and therefore less likely to cause or worsen acne and some of the most common birth controls that are high in androgen potency and more likely to wreak havoc on acne-prone skin.
